College Highlights

The rehabilitation education and research program has been ranked in the top 20 in the nation for the past decade on the *U.S. News & World Report's* listing of best graduate schools. The rehabilitation program was ranked at No. 16 in the new rankings released in March.

The college's graduate education programs are currently ranked No. 127 by *U.S. News*. That's a jump of 14 places from the college's ranking of 141 last year, which was the first time the graduate education programs were ranked.

The Master of Arts in Teaching program was recognized as one of the leading teacher preparation programs in the United States by the American Association of Teacher Educators.

University Recreation

The Department of University Recreation is the major campuswide service unit of the College of Education and Health Professions. The department serves the university community by providing a diverse selection of recreational opportunities and facilities designed to enhance the quality of life of participants. The department performs a vital role in

the recruitment and retention of students, faculty, and staff.
